RTSA - 48 years + and going strong, thanks to a strong community!

From the Desk of Ron Osborne



In 1971, RTSA started out in this community as Wesley Hall of Alamance, Inc. In 1990 the name was changed to Residential Treatment Services of Alamance, Inc. to more accurately reflect the services we provided. Now sometimes we do occasionally receive a call wanting us to come by and treat a house for bugs, etc., but since 1990 I believe most realize we are in the business of treating adults with substance use disorders and persons with mental illness.

We have grown over the years, and currently have a total of 43 beds in the community in four different locations. We serve approximately 550 people a year providing non-hospital medical detoxification, facility based crisis services, halfway house services, group home services and a recovery home for homeless women. We also operate a thrift store, Trollinger Treasures, which provides revenue to our recovery programs through the sale of donated goods. We own the Hall Avenue facility, Mebane Street Recovery Home for Women, the Administrative offices and Trollinger Treasures. We have two HUD group homes that will be deeded over to us when we have provided services in those homes for 40 years.

Each year, we generally operate on a shoestring budget. Over the years we added Trollinger Treasures to assist us in raising needed funds to provide services to those in need with no source of income. We have fundraisers during the year which include our

annual banquet and the jewelry sale that benefits the Women's Recovery Home on Mebane Street. We also have our annual Bid & Boogie - a fundraiser where we have dinner, a dance and silent and live auctions.

Our staff are top notch - we operate our entire operation with approximately 20 full time employees and about 15 part-time employees. These are licensed staff consisting of LCAS's, a CCS, RN's, a CPA and other staff trained in their field and certified when necessary. We also contract with a physician and a family nurse practioneer for services. Our facilities are maintained and look nice and are decorated appropriately. Our Board and staff maintain each of the facilities so all are comfortable and safe when receiving services.

The people we serve have been through some very difficult times; they often need to be retrained about everyday living while learning more about their addiction and/or mental illness. Nearly every person receiving services from RTSA states they feel secure, safe, respected and nurtured while in one of our recovery programs.

We have been providing treatment for over 48 years in this community. We have survived the many changes in the mental health and addictions field, and I attribute the survival of this agency to our supporters, our advocates and our financial donors. We need that strong advocacy and financial support to continue to meet the needs of our community and to continue to be a facilitator of change for our residents. I thank each and every one of you for your encouraging words, your thoughtful support and your prayers for our services to continue in this community. God bless you all!

Suboxone is now available for detoxification at RTSA

The RTSA Detoxification and Crisis Unit now offers Suboxone for those going through opiate withdrawals. The tapering dose makes the detoxification much more humane. This particular change in protocols began January 6, 2020.

If you are in need of detoxification for alcohol and/or other drugs, or in a mental health crisis, call the unit at 336-227-7417 for bed availability. Stays generally take 3-5 days with some cases needing a few more days, depending on the overall health of the patient. For those unable to pay for services, RTSA can generally provide services to all meeting the criteria for admission. We recently received a

donation which we are using to help pay for Suboxone and we are exploring other funding options since these monies are not quaranteed to always be available.

donations from our thrift store. Trollinger Treasures.

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
