The Dining Room at Hall Avenue has had the original furniture since 1975. We were able to replace it and the blinds and put up a new light fixture along with a paint job making the Dining Room look extra special. Thanks goes to *Julia Howard* for making a donation so the furniture could be purchased. Thanks to *Ricky & Seth* for prepping and painting the room; also thanks to Board Member *David Hunt of Blind Ambitions* for the donation of blinds. Also thanks to a *special donor* who remains anonymous for the purchase of a new light fixture.



We found that the kitchen flooring around the dish sanitizer had an unnoticed leak and we were in need of repairing and replacing the flooring in the kitchen. We had the dish sanitizer repaired, the kitchen, back foyer and adjoining bathroom Painted by volunteers from our Hall Avenue residents. We had the floor repaired and new flooring replaced in the kitchen, back foyer, adjoining bathroom along with the dining room. The flooring looks fabulous and cost us \$6,022.50. While moving the refrigerator it became inoperable. Our repairman told us parts were difficult to find and if he found them he wouldn't be able to guarantee how long the refrigerator would work. We were dealing with a 1992 model. So, we have now had to replace the commercial refrigerator at a cost of just over \$4,000..



These were repairs and expenses we had not anticipated so we are exploring assistance with these projects. If you are able, we would truly appreciate your support. The building is looking better and hopefully we have made some necessary repairs and purchases that will last a long time and benefit the recipients who are fortunate to be in recovery in one of the 25 beds at our Hall Avenue facility.
